ABOUT: UDABERRI DANTZA TALDEA

Udaberri is a dance and music group from Tolosa in the Basque Country. They will perform on Saturday during San Inazio (see schedule on page 1 of this newsletter).

'Udaberri Dantza Taldea' was founded in 1957 to preserve and recognize part of the popular culture and tradition of the Basque Country, especially in the context of folk dances and tunes. Through this work, we wanted to fill the gap in the Basque culture in Tolosa at the time. As the years progressed, new engagements were made. As a result, members of the group did research and recovered some forgotten dances.

Years of experience showed us the need for the group to create a dance school. Through the workshops and lectures of Basque dances, we try to transmit the basics of Basque dances to children, youth and adults, paving the way for the current adult group to present these dances in public places. In addition to performing in the nearby towns of Tolosa, we have shown the fruits of these studies throughout the Basque Country and at several Spanish festivals (Jaca, Salamanca, Córdoba, Gijón, Santiago de Compostela, Lugo, Gurre de Gallego). We've also been presenting our Basque culture to many other places in Europe.

By the late '90s, the group felt the need to adapt to new times and the desire of the audience. Thus, due to research and hard work, a show named 'Xirulikan' was offered in December 1992. By making a whole of lights, sounds, and other visual means, the natural meaning of the dances was sought to show and discern by carefully guarding aesthetics. The show was very successful, and consequently in 1993 the group decided to re-prepare and perform 'Xirulika'. The same way of thinking and working was determined to improve the scene. We set out guidelines for this, such as taking and restoring traditional clothes, preparing dancers for stage work, etc. The result of this work was a performance on Christmas Eve in 2000. And like the previous one, it was very successful. The Basque dances were in this show with jazz and theater.

From the experience gained in those performances and inspired by the innovative instinct of the members of the group, we began to organize shows that had broken the normal style of the group's performances and had an innovative feel.

Since then, the group offered their dances in a different way from their format, based on Basque 'erromeri's and popular gatherings. Since everything has its cycles, after this successful period of the group, a change of generation came inevitably. The young students of the school began to improve what they had learned and to expand their dance repertoire. After two or three years, the group changed completely.

Today, we are a young dance group, and we're working with a passion for repeating what our predecessors once did, recognizing the dance and music of the whole Basque Country.



ABOUT: KORRONTZI

The folk music band Korrontzi (Basque Country, 2004) was formed by the interpreter of trikitixa (Basque diatonic accordion) Agus Barandiaran. His objective, when forming the band, was to give to the Basque popular music a more modern and contemporary look but always from the perspective of a music based on the trikitixa and other traditional instruments such as the txalaparta or the alboka. He wanted to retain the ancestral and traditional sounds of the Basque land but always respecting the tradition he received from his first teacher, the old trikitixa player Rufino Arrola (1909-1996). To achieve this new sonority, he surrounded himself with more modern musical styles and had the help and union of instruments such as mandolin, electric bass, double bass or percussion.





Over the years, Korrontzi has taken our culture, language, dance and music all over the world, performing in countries such as: Belgium, USA, Romania, Cape Verde, Ireland, Brazil, Malaysia, Scotland, Holland, Greece, Italy, Canada, Hungary, Portugal, England, Cyprus, Morocco, Germany, Croatia, Slovenia, Austria, Czech Republic. Korrontzi has been awarded multiple international prizes and mentions.

Korrontzi is a Basque music group that leaves no one indifferent. It's a showcase from an entire culture, which with the strength and energy of its lives transmit sounds and dances rooted in antiquity, as well as the new trends of folk. Korrontzi is a traditional fiesta of Basque music and dance with an avant-garde vision, and the colors and landscapes of the Basque Country.

SAN INAZIO PILOTA EXHIBITION

When visiting and walking through towns in the Basque Country, you will notice a trio of buildings so sacred to locals that it is known as The Trinity: the town hall, the church, the fronton. Communities gather there to watch and play a dozen different ball games, known together as Euskal Pilota ... Euskal meaning Basque and Pilota meaning the specific type of ball—the Basque Country's centuries-old ball game.

We are very fortunate in Boise to have a fronton in the Anduiza Building where about 40 women and men play Euskal Pilota during the year. There are several different leagues managed by the Boise Fronton Association. Some play Esku Pilota (handball), where the players hit a hard leather ball with their bare hands; but the majority play Pala Goma, hitting a hard rubber ball with a wooden paddle. We also have a Pilota School where, in the last 5 years, Todor Azurtza has been teaching both Esku Pilota and Pala Goma to children. Eskerrik asko, Todor!

To celebrate San Inazio, the Boise Fronton Association has organized many pilota exhibition games that will be played by some of the best local players. The games are open to the public and free of charge. Come watch and enjoy!

2022 LEGACY AWARD RECIPIENTS

In 2001, the Euzkaldunak Board introduced the Legacy Award, which is given to individuals who have exhibited a long-term commitment to the goals of Euzkaldunak. During the May dinner, the Board announced the 2022 recipients-Regina Bastida Aldecoa and Julia ("Julie") Uberuaga Coleman. It was beautifully fitting that these two ladies—born in 1922 and celebrating 100th birthdays-would receive the award. Both Regina and Julie were Charter Members who were committed to the success of Euzkaldunak, beginning with its original foundation and early development of the Basque Center. Regina and Julie continuously have maintained their membership and commitment since 1949 until today!

2022 Legacy Award Recipient: Regina Bastida Aldecoa

Like many other charter members, Regina loaned personal money to the developing organization. By buying Euzkaldunak bonds, the land was purchased and the building construction began. When it came time to repay the loans of those bonds, Regina (and others) forgave the loan debt and donated their money so that Euzkaldunak, Inc., would have a lower financial burden as a new organization. That was Regina's first significant commitment—but her contributions have continued in numerous ways for 70+ years!

Regina served on the Euzkaldunak Board from 1960-63, with responsibilities as Chair for the Annual Dinner & Bazaar, as well as coordinating morzilla making, bingo, games, etc. She volunteered for many events that followed.

In 1962, Regina volunteered in becoming the first Oinkari Business Manager. The Oinkaris were a newly formed dance group. The State of Idaho had asked the Oinkaris to represent Idaho at the Seattle World's Fair (April 21-October 21, 1962). This was the first major event for the Oinkaris—who were accustomed to practices and some local performances. None of the leaders had experience to tackle a serious project that included extensive planning, financing, budgeting and fundraising. The Oinkari leadership, specifically Al Erquiaga and Diana Urresti, approached the Euzkaldunak Board. They were seeking help to make this trip possible. The Board was split about being involved with the project. Regina advocated that the Board and Basque Center should be involved—and she personally took on this task as her project, becoming the volunteer business manager.

Regina sought out and secured donations from the Idaho and eastern Oregon Basque communities. She successfully raised the necessary amounts, securing two large donations from community leaders. The owner of the Idaho Daily Statesman made a large contribution, as well as providing publicity. AJ Achabal, owner of Boise-Winnemucca Stages bus lines, donated the use and related expenses of two buses, including the fuel and the drivers for the entire trip. Achabal even voluntarily drove one bus himself with the help of Gus Urresti. This major project resulted in much community outreach, publicity and engagement from Basques and non-Basques, and the success helped launch the Oinkari Basque Dancers. A broader base was in place by the time the next major Oinkari event took place only two years later-the New York World's Fair in May-June 1964. Regina volunteered for years to come.

Regina's background includes her service as a nurse. During WWII she enlisted in the Army and served in base hospitals in California, tending to wounded soldiers who had been returned Stateside for care. When she returned to Boise, she worked as a nurse anesthetist at St. Luke's Hospital for 29 years. As a result of her professionalism and top-quality medical nursing, she received multiple accolades and awards. She regularly was called upon to interpret for Basque immigrants during their time of hospitalization. Regina continues to be a donor in the Boise and Basque community. At 100 years young, she still attends monthly dinners and is a friendly face to newcomers and to long-time members. If there is any legacy to our Basque community, it is because of mentors such as Regina Bastida Aldecoa.

2022 Legacy Award Recipient: Julia Uberuaga Coleman

Julie Uberuaga was born June 12, 1922; she would have celebrated her 100th birthday this summer. Julie passed away only weeks before the landmark day. Among the factors that make Julie such an important person to the establishment of the Euzkaldunak and the Basque Center is the circumstance of her birth. She was born "belonging" to the Basgue Boarding House at 607 Grove Street, where she grew up in the midst of Basque language, music, dance and food. She lived in the brick house on the Basque Block for her whole life in Boise-which was 53 years. In 1975 Julie was reconnected with a man she had met during college years at BJC. The second time was the charm; they married and moved to Santa Barbara. So why would a woman who lived the second half of her life away from Boise be a deserving candidate for the Euzkaldunak Legacy Award? The answer lies in Julie's dedication in just the first three years of the birth of the Euzkaldunak and Basque Center.

The first organizational meeting of the Boise Basque community to establish a "Center" was held February 6, 1949. Julie was 26 years old at this time. Likely, about 70 people were in attendance. Julie's service started here, as she and her brother Joe Uberuaga were chosen to be a team as secretary-treasurer. Julie was also elected to the By-Law Committee--along with Gus Urresti, Louis Madarieta, Lydia Lachiondo, Domingo Ansotegui-to establish the "rules of incorporation"; she also served as the record-keeper. Two weeks later at the first meeting of the newly formed Euzkaldunak, Inc., the By-Laws and articles of incorporation were approved. The articles covered membership eligibility, dues, annual meetings, quorums, committees, not-for-profit organization... and more! All this was accomplished in two weeks!

At the first Board of Directors meeting, Julie was appointed to handle the banking for the new corporation, in addition to sharing secretarial duties. After the initial meetings in February 1949, the Board of Directors met **15** more times through December... Julie was present at all.

Julia Uberuaga Coleman (cont'd)

One of the first activities of the Euzkaldunak Board was supporting Boise Music Week, whereby "Song of the Basque" was produced-with two sold-out performances. Among the 16 "dark-eyed, red-skirted dancers" (a favorite part of the show) was Julie. In addition, the Board also sponsored these activities in that first year: Basque Picnic, Polio Benefit Dance, Box Social, Farmer's Dance, and Christmas Night Dance. Because of Julie's outstanding handwritten and then typed notes. we have knowledge of how our Euzkaldunak and Basque Center developed and what activities and services it offered to its *members*. She also had typed a financial report for each of the activities. Julie made the blueprint for records to come, and she was solely responsible for all the minutes, records and fiscal transactions.

By the December 13 Board meeting, 2,000 membership cards for the year 1950 had been printed. Responsibility for the membership cards and their sale landed with Julie. She sold 66 cards at \$5 apiece at the Annual Christmas Night Dance on December 25, 1949. She continued with the membership card responsibilities for years to come, as well as her work with the By-Laws committee. At the second General Membership Meeting January 7, 1950, Julie gave minutes of the previous year's meeting, records of events for 1949, financial reports of activities, and the balance of funds in checking/savings accounts as of 12/31/49. Again, the main discussion at this general membership meeting was finding a lot or building to establish our own facility. This was an important issue for which Julie soon would be involved. By January 1951, the options for a building site for a "Basque Center" had been narrowed down; the Uberuaga lot at 6th & Grove at \$8,000 was the first choice. Once the Board made the decision to buy this 60 x 120-foot corner lot, negotiations were handled by the designated Board representatives, Hermenegilda Uberuaga, and Julie. Hermenegilda spoke limited English; Julie spoke Basque and of course English. Julie helped negotiate the sale and contracts, including the banking and payback terms. This was a wonderful location-a great deal for Euzkaldunak.

Julie continued to serve Euzkaldunak and the community for many years. In 1951 she was chairman of the Membership Committee-at which time she recommended that a mailing be sent to members (precursor to our newsletter). She also suggested that efforts be made to include the many sheepherders living in boarding houses in membership. Julie served on the Insurance Committee and jumped in as Co-Chairman (with friend Lydia Jausoro) for the Social Committee in 1955. In addition to planning floats for parades, dances, dinners, card parties, concession stands... Julie continued to participate. Julie Uberuaga was among the women whom Euzkaldunak acknowledged in 2006 Legacy Awards as part of the Early Kitchen Crew. She was always in the basement after Basque dinners, washing dishes and cleaning the kitchen.

Because Julie was gone from Boise for so long, it is understandable that her receiving the Legacy Award would be questionable. However, her dedication during our organization's infancy was **intense**. She was active in all facets during those critical early years and accomplished more than would seem possible. Julia Uberuaga Coleman was an Euzkaldunak founder and a true Charter Member.
