BASQUE STRENGTH & ENDURANCE

While Superman and Supergirl are fictional characters from the golden age of comics, at the San Inazio Games, we witnessed outstanding feats of strength, stamina and perseverance of our own REAL Superman and Supergirl. Traditionally 'txinga eramatea' is about carrying competition weights in both hands as far as possible. There usually is no time limit but the txingas weigh between 23 to 48 kg each (50 to 104 lbs) and may not be put down or supported by any other part of the body. Competitors may hold them only by the handles and are not allowed to put their hands through the handles. The aim is to complete as many laps of a 61m (200ft) circuit as possible. Competitors each set their own pace and may stop (without putting the weights down).

OINKARI NEW KIDS



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UDALEKU 2022

In 2022, Euzkaldunak offered partial scholarships to 18 local Basque children who were interested in attending Udaleku (held this summer in Bakersfield, CA).

Formerly known as Music Camp, Udaleku came into being in April 1974 when various Basque clubs joined together to create the North American Basque Organizations, Inc. (NABO) with the purpose of promoting and encouraging our common Basque heritage. Since those early days, the bonds among Basques here in the United States have been strengthened and extended. The annual Udaleku sponsored by NABO and hosted by one of our member organizations has contributed much to this growth.

The first camp was held in Boise, Idaho (Bogus Basin), in 1975. Since then, hundreds of young Basques have gathered for two weeks each summer in a different city of the extended Basque community in the United States. Under the direction of local and visiting talent from Europe, participants study Basque folk dance, music (either txistu or accordion), singing and games (such as "mus" and "pala").

Besides being a good learning experience, the camp offered the participants a great opportunity to develop ties and friendships with other young Basques from many states whose parents and ancestors came from both the northern and southern parts of "Euskal Herria" or the Basque Country. The relationships they formed over the two-week period increases the present and future interaction among all of our Basque clubs.

History Corner: Pilota & the Boise Fronton

History Corner is a featured column in the Euzkaldunak newsletter that is written by members of the Basque Center Renovation Committee. Our seven-decade old building is aging and needs our enthusiasm and support to carry our traditions forward for the next seven decades and beyond. The goals of the History Corner are: 1) highlight the many beloved traditions we can carry out thanks to having access to a Basque Center, and 2) educate members about our rich Boise Basque history.





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The Anduiza Hotel and Fronton was built in 1914 by Juan and Juana Anduiza, and at the time it was one of many Basque boarding houses in the area. Unlike traditional frontons, the Anduizas built theirs indoors and joined it with the boarding house as an added community attraction, often doubling as a dance hall. At 32.5 meters (107 feet) long and 12 meters (39 feet) high, it was the longest handball court in Boise. Today it is the only fronton in Boise and the only one in the area that hosts regular pilota leagues.

Dan Everhart from Preservation Idaho said the fronton building is one of the city's most notable historic structures, largely due to its rare combination of uses. "Everything about that building was tied to the court. It wasn't like a boarding house with a court attached. It was more like a court with a boarding house attached," said Everhart.

In 1945, the Anduiza family sold the building. Between 1945 and 1993, the building was owned by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs for a short time, and it was then sold to the Briggs Engineering firm. The engineering firm used the boarding house portion of the building for offices but never remodeled or

repurposed the fronton portion of the building. In 1972, the Idaho Basque Studies Program partnered with Briggs Engineering to restore the fronton and re-open it for community use. In 1993, Adelia Garro Simplot & Rich Hormaechea purchased the building. The former boarding house rooms are still leased as office and storage space, and Boise Fronton Association (BFA) has use of the fronton court for pilota.

Since the 1990s, volunteer pilota commissioners Dan Ansotegui (1992-2000), Edu Sarria (2000-2015), Martin Bilbao (2015-2018) Todor Azurtza & Geneva Ayarra (2018-present), Tyler Smith, Henar Chico, PJ Mansisidor, Jude Gary, Annie Gavica, Edie Jones, Mary Lasuen, Lael Uberuaga, BFA Treasurer Jerry Aldape, and countless other league volunteers have helped carry on the tradition of Boise Pilota by organizing leagues and recruiting new members. Around the year 2010, a group of pilotaris including Edu Sarria and Jon Arrieta formed a group and secured funding from private donations, as well as a grant from the Cenarrusa foundation, to renovate the fronton in advance of Jaialdi 2010. "The contractor we used for the renovation told us that with our 'small' (~30k) budget, the improvements were like putting lipstick on a pig, but it was what we had to work with and we were able to make upgrades that really helped improve the space for playing," recalls Sarria.

Around the same time as the remodel project, the fronton organizers also opened up leagues for women; up until this point, pilota leagues were men only. Female and male Boise pilotaris began traveling to regional N.A.B.O. tournaments as part of the Boise Fronton Association, and for many years Boise hosted a pilota invitational with visiting players competing during the annual San Inazio festival.



Pilota today

Today, BFA has 40 members that play mainly pala in the fronton via two "men's" leagues and one "women's" league (though any gender can play in any of the leagues based on their skillset). League games are played weekly at the fronton in fall and spring seasons, but members can also play outside of the organized schedules. There are also a few players that still play *esku* (handball) and even represent the US in some international competitions.

Todor Azurtza, one of the current BFA commissioners, recognizes that like any

tradition, to keep it alive requires new blood. Toward that end, Boiseko Pilota Eskola has been teaching pilota to kids since 2016, both esku and pala. This summer, with a generous gift from the John Kirtland foundation, the Basque Museum and Cultural Center hosted a youth pilota camp.

Azurtza thinks that more pilota camps will likely be held in the future."The challenge will be to bring younger generations to pilota and have them start playing at an earlier age. We could probably work on building bridges between Boiseko/Oinkaris and BFA in order to introduce dancers to pilota," he said. "We are extremely lucky to have such a great fronton in Boise which gives us a great opportunity to maintain this Basque tradition and keep it alive. I believe that we as a community should work on this challenge because pilota does not only belong to BFA."

Anyone can become a BFA member and start playing pilota - no prior experience is necessary, and you don't even have to be Basque!. Membership is \$100 per calendar year (spring + fall seasons) and new members can start at \$50 for their first year. For anyone interested in playing pilota in the fall 2022 season, fall league begins the second week of September. Contact <u>boisefronton@gmail.com</u> for more information on signing up - games are starting soon!
